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10 WAYS TO AVOID KITCHEN RENO DISASTERS

Kitchen renovations can start out as the small snowball at the top of the hill and quickly spiral out of control. Here are some tips from the experts at FLOFORM to ensure your project doesn't begin to roll down the hill.

1. RESEARCH IDEAS AND INSPIRATION

Much like going to the hair stylist with a picture from a magazine, going into your kitchen renovation with some ideas and inspiration of your own can help you dial in the scope of your project. Do research online and make note of some key elements from kitchens you really like help determine your own style.

2 DETERMINE YOUR BUDGET

Though we all have champagne tastes, most of us only have beer budgets. Only you can determine what size of a budget you are prepared to invest. Take some time to research the costs of average kitchen renos and decide whether or not your budget is capable of getting what you want. 5. KNOW THE PROS AND CONS OF DIFFERENT MATERIALS

There are several material choices available to you within each facet of your kitchen renovation. For example, options for kitchen countertops range from natural stone (granite, marble), engineered stone (quartz), solid surface materials, laminate, wood, and more. Understanding the benefits and risks of each material will help you plan.

6. EXPLORE HOW LIGHTING IMPACTS YOUR DESIGN CHOICES

One of the most important elements in determining the functionality and the aesthetic enjoyment of your kitchen is lighting. Different bulbs (Halogen, CFL, LED) cast different shades of light ranging from yellow to bright white. The warmth or coolness of the light can dramatically change the tone, depth and overall impression of your kitchen.

7. USE LICENSED AND INSURED CONTRACTORS

Anything worth doing is worth doing right. This especially applies to your kitchen. Using professionals for your project not only ensures it will be done correctly; it also provides you with the peace of mind to know that they are liable for their work.

8. GET IT ALL IN WRITING

Following point seven should put you in a good position here. Reputable and professional companies always use legal contracts as part of the purchase agreement. This contract not only confirms the parameters of a project, it



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also protects you by limiting your liabilities and providing a full warranty.


9. PREPARE TO BE UNCOMFORTABLE (FOR A LITTLE WHILE)

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WHY LIGHTING MATTERS

Lighting might not be top of mind when it comes to choosing a countertop – but perhaps it should be.

After all, the warmth or coolness of the light can have a dramatic effect on how the countertop looks. Using warmer lights (such as incandescent lighting) will bring out yellow undertones in a white countertop, for example, whereas using brighter lights (such as CFL) will bring out cooler shades.

Lighting matters more for countertops than any other area in the kitchen particularly because the light shines directly onto countertops. As the nearest, largest expanse of horizontal surface to the light, the lighting in your kitchen will reflect most upon your countertops.

Tones of white light are measured in degrees of Kelvin. The higher degree of Kelvin will result in lighting that will appear bluish and cooler, whereas lower degrees of Kelvin will result in a more yellow and warmer tone.

Here's a guide to help you achieve the perfect end result: An inviting environment that works with your other design elements to create a practical workspace and lively entertainment area.

SOFT WHITE/WARM WHITE (2700K – 3000K):


Recommended for bedrooms and living rooms; providing a warm and cozy light

BRIGHT WHITE/COOL WHITE (3500K – 4100K):

Recommended for kitchens & bathrooms; providing a whiter, more energetic feel

DAYLIGHT (5000K – 6500K)

Recommended for bathrooms, kitchens and basements; best for reading, intricate projects, or applying makeup – provides the greatest contrast among colors.



HOW TO MATCH KITCHEN CABINETS & COUNTERTOPS

WHAT COLOR OF COUNTERTOP GOES BEST WITH MY CABINETS?

Whether you are renovating your entire kitchen or just your countertops, the countertops you choose can either be the focal point or something that anchors the rest of your kitchen. For example, a bright countertop design with lots of movement would be a statement piece in your kitchen. On the other hand, a dark design with no movement is a piece that balances the space and brings it all together. When choosing a specific design

for your countertop, there is more to consider than simply just your cabinetry. Elements such as flooring, backsplash, appliances and wall color are all visual components that come together to create your overall look. Let's take a look at some different combinations and let you decide which one works best.

DARK DESIGN WITH MOVEMENT ON DARK CABINETS

This image featuring Cambria's Ellesmere is a perfect dark on dark example where the countertop is the

focal point. Lots of movement in the quartz draws the eye and works well with the simple flooring, furniture and walls.

LIGHT DESIGN WITH MOVEMENT ON DARK CABINETS

This kitchen featuring Cambria's Seagrove from the Coastal Collection is a brilliant mix of dark, mid and light tones. The dark cabinets used for the island are a strong contrast to the lighter main kitchen cabinets. This is a trend that doesn't seem to be getting old!



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LIGHT ON DARK

This mix of dark cabinetry and light countertops featuring Cambria's Berwyn really nails it. Berwyn's mix of whites, ivories and creams with subtle grey veining and hints of metallics compliments the hardware but pops against the black cabinets. In a room with lots of natural light, Berwyn really shines.



DARK ON LIGHT

When white on white is just a little too bright, a great alternative is a darker countertop design, like Cambria's Hampshire, that allows the kitchen's accents to stand out. This style really adds depth and detail to your kitchen.



WHITE ON WHITE ON WHITE!

MAINTENANCE

No sealing, polishing or reconditioning is needed.

STAIN RESISTANT

Quartz is nonporous, nonabsorbent and will resist most stains, moisture and harmful bacteria.

HEAT/SCRATCH RESISTANT

Though you shouldn't deliberately try to scratch your countertop or leave a hot pot on it, Quartz is highly durable and is Heat and Scratch resistant.

HYGIENIC

Quartz is nonporous, making cleanup easy and preventing food and moisture from penetrating its surface—the main source of growth for harmful bacteria.

CLEANING

Simply wash with warm water.

DURABILITY

Independent laboratory tests prove that natural quartz surfaces are significantly stronger and more flexible than granite.

APPEARANCE

The Quartz colouring and designs are engineered, not natural. This allows your countertops to be consistent throughout your entire kitchen. It's easy to match, with no surprises in colour, pattern or texture.

GRANITE

MAINTENANCE

Most Granite countertops require sealing every one to three years.

STAIN RESISTANT

Granite is a porous stone, and is not stain-resistant. Sealing the granite will help prevent stains.

HEAT/SCRATCH RESISTANT

Granite is a durable stone and is extremely Heat resistant. However, harder blows from heavier items may scratch or damage the granite.

HYGIENIC

Granite is a porous stone, making it easier for bacteria to set in. Sealing the granite will help prevent protect the granite against the growth of bacteria.

CLEANING

Granite requires special products that are specific to Granite countertops.

DURABILITY

Granite is a strong stone, however it is more susceptible to damage than quartz. It is a more porous stone, that contains weaker minerals.

APPEARANCE

Granite is mined directly from a large piece of stone in nature, later being cut down into individual slabs. Since this is natural stone, no two pieces will be exactly alike.
